Community Garden at LPUMC

Tomatoes, green peppers, jalapenos, squash, cucumbers and watermelons. What do all these vegetables have in common? They are all grown in the community garden at Laurel Park United Methodist Church.

Laurel Park's Teri Harris told me that church members had been talking for years about starting such a garden to share food with the community.



She said that this spring, "we stepped out in faith to make it happen."

They had some money budgeted, and community donations helped them get set up. The greenhouse across the street from the church donated some nursery plants and the Pete Rose landscaping company gave gravel and topsoil. Church members placed raised beds on the church grounds with gravel on the bottom and mesh to control weeds. A new water line was laid, with a cool spigot and hose, so no one will have to drag heavy hoses from the building for watering.

The vegetables have been thriving. Church members have given produce to Aggie's Attic, and just recently they brought some to give out with the free food distributed on Fridays at Greenwood. The garden is open to anyone who needs fresh vegetables. If you know of someone who does, you are welcome to go to the garden and take what you need.

Some church members have signed up to pick vegetables and water the garden. If you would like to help, you can text Teri Harris (804-398-8558) or Bubba Harris (804-432-2566) and let them know your availability. They usually water the garden early in the morning or after 6:30 p.m., and it usually takes about half an hour to give it a good soaking.

Once the harvest is done, church members plan to till the area in preparation for next year.

Please join me in thanking God for raining down his blessings on this garden.

August is School Supplies Month

This month the people of Greenwood are collecting school supplies in support of needy pupils at Longdale Elementary School and at the UMFS Charterhouse School.

Donations for Longdale should be brought to the Sanctuary by Sunday, **Aug. 25**. The Ruth Circle is sponsoring the **Charterhouse** drive; those donations should be left in the bag in the narthex by Sunday,



Aug. 11. Lists of needed supplies are posted in the narthex and printed in each Sunday's bulletin.

Charterhouse School is an affiliate of **United Methodist Family Services** (UMFS), offering year-round comprehensive educational services for students ages 5 to 22. Students at Charterhouse School come from UMFS's Child & Family Healing Center (an intensive residential treatment program) and from the greater Richmond area.

The Charterhouse School Day Program serves commuter students with **special needs**. These students struggle to function in the public school setting due to learning, emotional or intellectual disabilities, Autism Spectrum Disorder or other health impairments. In addition to academic instruction, educational services support the development of social, organizational, behavioral and independent living skills.

Beginning as an orphanage in 1900, UMFS today provides a **comprehensive network of services for children and families** across Virginia. UMFS's mission is to be unwavering champions for high-risk children and families, collaborating with communities to help them reach their full potential.

Children are an important part of many of the stories in the Bible. Each month we will post information about a child mentioned in God's Word. See if you can guess the identity of the child and the Bible reference.

The last question was: This boy had a colorful coat that made his brothers jealous. The answer is: Joseph. In Genesis 37:2-4 we learn about him and his brothers:



"This is the story of the family of Jacob. Joseph, being seventeen years old, was shepherding the flock with his brothers; he was a helper to the sons of Bilhah and Zilpah, his father's wives; and Joseph brought a bad report of them to their father. Now Israel (Jacob) loved Joseph more than any other of his children, because he was the son of his old age; and he had made him a long robe with sleeves (a coat of many colors). But when his brothers saw that their father loved him more than all his brothers, they hated him, and could not speak peaceably to him."

We know a long robe with sleeves was a luxurious garment, different from the ordinary sleeveless tunic that reached to the knees. It would be impossible to undertake any manual labor while wearing it.

Disaster Preparedness

To be prepared, here are some things to do before disaster strikes.

Discuss a **rendezvous point** with your family. If a disaster occurs, some family members may be in different locations. So pick a meeting place in a safe spot away from home.



Create a **car emergency kit**. Include a first aid kit, phone chargers, flashlight, spare tire and jumper cables. Check periodically to make sure each item is still usable. (This kit should be a standard item in all your cars.)

Pack a travel bag for each family member. Besides clothes and toiletries, include a blanket and sturdy shoes for each person. Pack extra keys to your home and vehicles, cash in small bills, emergency contact information and a home inventory in case you have to file an insurance claim later.

Download banking, insurance and emergency service mobile apps to your smartphone now so they'll be available in a crisis. During a disaster, texting may be more reliable than calling because it uses less bandwidth. Sign up for emergency text alerts from your city, county and state, and insurance company, if available.


Review all your insurance policies: auto, home or renters, valuables, flood, life and health. Be sure you have adequate coverage to help you fully recover after a loss. Also, be sure you understand what is and is not covered and know your deductible levels. Understand how coverage suspension may affect you. Know whether you have wind and flooding coverage. Do your policies include coverage for evacuation expenses?

Will Your Car Battery Survive The Heat?

Most drivers know that the cold is rough on car batteries, but, according to the American Automobile Association (AAA) heat is actually the number one cause of battery failure and reduced battery life. Extreme heat accelerates the rate of fluid loss and the resulting oxidation of battery components, which can leave you unexpectedly stranded.



Warning Signs

- Your car doesn't start immediately or makes a clicking noise when you turn the key.
- Your headlights or interior lights are dimmer than normal, or the power windows are working slower than usual.
- You see stains or signs of corrosion on the battery itself.
- Your battery is more than three years old.
- You take a lot of short trips where the car is turned on and off often, or you
 have long stretches of time (weeks or months) where the car is not used at all.

What You Can Do

- Turn off your lights, wipers, and A/C before you turn off your engine at the
 end of a drive to prevent an unnecessary drain on the battery the next time
 you start your car (this is good advice always).
- Unplug phone chargers and USB cables for devices as soon as you turn off your engine (for the same reason as above).
- Avoid using your car's air conditioner longer than you have to, as the A/C system puts high demands on your battery.
- If you see corrosion on your battery, clean it or have it cleaned by a trained technician.
- If you consistently go two weeks or longer without using your car, invest in a battery tender (trickle charger) to keep the battery charged.
